#### Wabanica Lutheran Church - Annual Meeting Minutes - January 19, 2020

The meeting was called to order by President Ken Horntvedt at 9:40 a.m. with about 30 members present. Ken opened with the Litany in back of the Annual Report booklet and a hymn.

Motion by Bruce Streich., second by Sandy Muggli, to accept the Agenda. Motion carried. Motion by Roger Erickson, second by Jody Horntvedt, to approve the Minutes from last year's Annual Meeting. Motion carried.

#### **Financial Reports**

The Financial Secretary's Report shows total income of \$111,317.00. The Treasurer's Report shows a General Fund balance on hand of \$32,290.18. The Building Fund gained \$4,090.00 with Fourth Sunday Offerings. Motion made by Carol Erickson, second by Rex Muggli, to accept the Financial Reports. Motion carried. Discussion as to whether we want two people to count the weekly offerings at the church, as recommended by Synod, or have varying pairs of "counters" as needed. Decided that what we are doing works well for us, so no change at this time. More online giving is available with the GivePlus app and that info will be shared.

#### Pastor's Report

Pastor Birgitte has been our pastor since February 2019! She has learned that we are committed to working together, curious about our faith, and want to know how/who we can serve. Highlights of the year: Joint Worship Services, Soul Food, and the Ploughing Competition. Pastor brought up the Area Conversation Meeting to be held on February 16 at Clementson. Bishop Bill Tesch and two others will lead this discussion about the fact that nine congregations from here to Roseau are served by only two full-time pastors, an interim pastor, and a part-time SAM. The meeting is open to anyone concerned about the future of ministry in our area.

**Committee Reports** are included in the Annual Report and all are encouraged to read them and enjoy the photos of all the activities. Thank you to all involved in any way with the work of our church. Sign-up sheets will be available in an effort to include more members.

Building and Grounds: Ken shared on the Soil and Water Conservation award received for our riverbank project. He and Jody attended the event in the Cities and have a plaque to be displayed at church. We were reimbursed 70% for the project. Not quite done as crushed rock is needed to prevent more erosion (as recommended by locals and not heeded by engineers). The flagpole will be placed by the rock at our entrance.

Judy Griffen noted that the financial report for the Quilters is not included here. They had \$3,801.39 to begin the year and took in \$1000 through quilt sales and memorials. After expenditures for quilting supplies, the end of December balance = \$4,362.83.

#### **Old Business**

1. Lake of the Woods Bible Camp (LOWBC) - The Bible Camp is for sale, with Reed Realty appraisal of \$700,000- \$900.000 for 60 acres, 2500 feet of river frontage. Second appraisal coming from ReMax in Bemidji. The property is to be put out on bids for 2-3 months, then consider top 2-3 bids. If it sells, money to be divided among the 28 churches. Motion by Roger Erickson, second by Shelley Spears, to form a task force to look into the parcel with the buildings, about 20 acres, and to see if Mt. Olivet in Moorhead is interested in purchasing this with us. Motion carried. Pastor Birgitte, Bruce Streich, Shelley Spears, and Roger Erickson to be on the task force. Notice to be put in the announcements as others are welcome to join the group.

- 2. Pie and Ice Cream Social will be the 3rd Sunday in July. Deb Perala agreed to coordinate it again and see if the Community Band will play. Motion by Roger Erickson, second by Jody Horntvedt, that the Council decide where the profit is to be spent. Motion carried.
- 3. The updated Constitution that we approved last year now needs to be ratified. Motion by Carol Erickson, second by Jody, to ratify our Constitution and submit to Synod. Motion carried.
- 4. Pizza Nights will continue under the direction of Roger and Carol Erickson, with proceeds for the six nights, from April November, to go to the General Fund as before.

#### **New Business**

- 1. Mission Plan Our percentage of parish expenses is 37.18% for 2020. Monthly amount needed to meet our 2020 Mission Plan is \$7,992.17. Motion by Roger, second by Doris Nelson, to accept the 2020 Mission Plan as presented. Motion carried.
- 2. Elections: Nominations by the Council include: President: Roger Erickson, Vice president: Brian Peterson, Secretary: Deb Perala, and Financial Secretary: Ken Horntvedt, all for 2-year terms. Members at Large: Shelley Spears and Colleen Stanton, each for 3-year terms, and Dale Brune for a 1-year term. Motion by Bruce Streich, second by Gloriann Fischer, to cease nominations and cast a unanimous ballot for these candidates. Motion carried.
- 3. The Synod Assembly will be June 12-13 at Concordia College in Moorhead. Two voting delegates needed, one male, one female will seek volunteers.
- 4. Appointments and Volunteers remain mostly the same, and we thank them all.
- 5. Discussion to see if any interest in broadcasting our weekly church service on new local radio station, 94.5, The River. No action taken due to lack of interest at this time.

Motion by Brian Peterson, second by Rex Muggli, to adjourn. Motion carried, and we adjourned at 11:15 a.m. with The Lord's Prayer.

Dear Beloved in Christ of the Northwestern Minnesota Synod,

I am writing in the final days of 2020, a year we will be happy to put behind us! In Luke 2, old Simeon meets the baby Jesus and praises God, because in this child the long era of Israel's oppression was behind them and a new era of salvation was dawning. Yet the baby Jesus was, like all babies, all promise and no product. Simeon may have died a satisfied man, but had he lived 33 more years, he would have seen Jesus fulfill some promises... and leave others yet to be fulfilled. Now we live in "the time between." This is the time between the revelation of Emmanuel, God with us in all of life, and the time when Jesus "will come again to judge the living and the dead," bringing justice and healing to all. In this time, we walk with the faith of Simeon, thanking God for the salvation we have seen and trusting God for the salvation yet to come. Our Gospel work is also shaped by the "inbetween-ness" of these times. We are reassured by the countless ways that God has been faithful to us and to our church in the past, even while we trust that God will continue to show up for us in the daunting challenges we face in the future.

Please take a look at the enclosed/attached document which describes just some of the work we've been about as your synod staff this last year. This list is by no means comprehensive (that would be long, and possibly boring!). It's just the result of some brainstorming at one staff meeting last fall.

Since the start of the pandemic, I've understood our work to be keeping people connected, encouraged, informed and resourced. This has involved weekly and now semi-monthly virtual gatherings with rostered leaders, weekly and now monthly virtual meetings with congregation presidents, along with what has now become a vast collection of resources for church leadership in time of pandemic, COVID safety resources, virtual ministry resources, online worship services, etc.

This last year we've also been hard at work on our new strategic plan for the NW MN Synod. The plan flows from our vision: a people set free by the Gospel to be wholly devoted to Jesus and our neighbor in love. It is guided by our mission to foster safe and healthy places for the ministry of the Gospel to unfold and to shape an abundant future for all. It will focus on four lines of effort: vital small-membership congregations, leadership development, striving for justice and peace and responding to emerging change. Watch for more information on the strategic plan early this year.

Dear ones, thank you for your faithfulness in the Gospel! When the pandemic hit, you quickly adapted and found ways to share the good news in changed and challenging circumstances. Thanks also for your generosity that makes ministry happen, not only there in your congregation, but through your Mission Support, all across NWMN and around the world! Good work. Be encouraged: we are in this together.

- Provided over 200 hours of "boots on the ground" support for leaders and communities from our Synod Ministers for Community and Leader Engagement.
- ❖ Responded to the COVID-19 crisis with resources, coaching and giving 76 congregations and individual pastoral leaders resiliency grants totaling \$35,420 (as of 12/15/2020).
- ❖ Host weekly Zoom meetings for council presidents, pastoral leaders, and those working with First Third of Life ministry, offering support and resources.
- Accompanied 66 rostered leaders and SAMs to their call to serve in congregations, parishes, care centers, and outreach ministry across our Synod.

- ❖ Prepared a virtual Middle School Gathering resource for congregations to use with youth groups, confirmation, or as a retreat in this unique time that we all are living in.
- ❖ Are starting new worshipping communities in Moorhead with people experiencing homelessness, and in Bemidji with young adults.
- ❖ Equip and encourage lay leadership through LIFE Living in Faith Everyday (formerly known as the School for Lay Ministry).
- ❖ Provided on-site guidance and support to 11 congregations in a conflict situation.

#### Friends in Christ,

What a year it has been. I am so tired of saying "unprecedented" and yet it is the only word to describe this year. For us it has been unprecedented in more ways than just CoVid.

The year 2020 began with hopes for a continued successful trimester with Soul Food, a new staffing organization, and even a strategic plan in our conference. We were prepared for a year of change and growth, one that would focus on possibility and potential.

In February Jeannie Haukaas retired after nearly three decades of work with the Parish. We kicked off Lent expecting to dig into our commitment as disciples and asking the question, "why Jesus?"; then CoVid restrictions began. Suddenly the whole system of the world and our parish was completely off. There was no more sense of normalcy and only constant questions of "how do we do this" and "what will happen next?" Alyse Berggren stepped into a full-time role in order to get the office reorganized and archived; she served full time until August when she stepped back to part time work as a contracted employee. After many conversations and planning sessions with the Parish presidents and the personnel committee, two contracted job descriptions were written up- one for an office manager and one for a confirmation director. The confirmation director role was filled by Sam Lyon and plans were put in place to begin a new format for confirmation (see Sam's report for more details). Then Alyse died and the systems in the office that she was sustaining dropped off as well.

Thankfully, the office is now in the capable and caring hands of Calista Wolf. The parish spent the last quarter of the year trying to worship both online and in person, heading back to the parking lot for advent, and finding ways to bring some joy in the midst of struggle.

We all kept saying, "2020 is the worst, I can't wait until it's over." Now it's over and there is a light at the end of the tunnel, but we have a ways to go still. Psalm 126 is a guiding voice of reality and hope for me these days and I hope that it can be for you as well. The psalmist writes a song called "A Harvest of Joy"; it is a song that bears the weight of sorrow and the promise that sorrow will not win. Verse 5 says, "may those who sow in tears reap with shouts of joy." This year we have planted many seeds- resilience, flexibility, creativity, connection- but they were all sown with tears. These seeds were only planted because of global pandemic and death of loved ones, and yet they are seeds that we will be able to harvest with joy. We can see the light at the end of the tunnel, we know that 2021 will be different from 2020, and we will build and rebuild in this new year. Just as verse 1 says, when the Lord restores the fortunes, we will be like those who dream. This year we will pick up our dreams from last year, dust them off, decide if they still fit this new world and our new harvest. We will reinvest in our congregations, asking for God's direction and the Spirit's guidance so we too may sing "the Lord has done great things for us" and come home with shouts of joy, carrying the fruit of our labors.

#### Wabanica Health and Wellness Report 2020

What can I say? COVID has changed the duties of the Parish Nurse as well as everyone else. We were able to have two Services of Healing before the pandemic hit us. Although there were no cases in LOW county until July, in March everything got shut down and that included in-church worship. This was done with orders from the CDC. Just when we needed the church the most, and the services of healing, we were closed down. With the work of our Pastor, and other innovative members, we were still able to have online, phone and parking lot services. A task force was set up in the parish to plan how we could do church services, once we were able to attend, following CDC guidelines. When the church opened up, we followed the following guidelines: hand sanitizing stations, masks, social distancing and no singing. This worked until we were shut down again. We went back online, but since people expressed a need for music and to sing, parking lot services were added for Advent and Christmas. The parking lot services allowed us to sing, greet and meet people which felt great.

We were unable to go Christmas Caroling to the Assisted Living, Nursing Home and Senior Apartment buildings. These are the vulnerable people that have been hit hardest and have been under quarantine all these months. They have been unable to have visitors, families and activities come in. We need to keep these people in prayer. Please call, send mail or set up window visits. I have attempted to keep in touch with these, and those in their homes. Thank you to the members for informing me of those with special needs.

Our Public Health, medical staff, front line workers, and our community have been proactive. Our first case was in July and we were the last county to have a reported case. Testing is done locally, but if people need hospitalization, they are sent out to facilities that can handle COVID. This keeps our hospital and clinic open to those in need. Vaccination has started. I am praying that 2021 will finally get us back to a new normal, that will make us more caring and giving people.

#### ROLE OF THE COMMITTEE:

- → Paying attention to OSHA guidelines and other safety issues (i.e. fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors, exit lighting, etc.),
- → Maintaining indoor/outdoor equipment (i.e. check for safety/cleanliness of electrical appliances, playground equipment, etc.),
- → Identifying (annually) individuals to serve as janitors, lawn maintenance, and others as needed
- Scheduling clean-up events (i.e. interior cleaning including carpets, window washing, spring clean-up of grounds, trimming trees and shrubs, etc.),, and
- → Other responsibilities as identified by the Building and Grounds Committee and/or requested by the church council.

#### ROLE OF THE COMMITTEE:

The role of the Education Committee is to guide the educational programs for Wabanica Lutheran Church. Their responsibilities include, and are not limited to the following:

- Providing structure to youth education programs (i.e. Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, etc.).
- Providing guidance for parish-wide Christian education (i.e. First Communion, Confirmation, etc.).
- Maintaining calendars/records relating to education in the congregation (i.e. Confirmation photo book, attendance at Bible studies, Sunday School and Vacation Bible School, etc.),
- Coordinating the Splash! Kits (for Baptism) and Splash! Packs (newsletters and music CDs for families with children from Birth to Age 3)

- Supporting opportunities for ongoing Christian education for all ages (i.e. Bible studies, retreats, educational bulletin boards, etc.), *and*

#### 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

We accomplished the following...

#### Sunday School in 2020.

A small group met with Pastor Birgitte on February 20 to discuss plans for Sunday School for youth in the congregation. Several ideas and options were discussed and the following items were determined:

**Curriculum:** Use the KidsStuff bulletins and include a Craft Day (on Youth Sunday, with Confirmation-aged youth teaching it)

**Schedule:** Sunday Morning Sunday School Program to be offered: 1) Spring (Easter through the end of the school year), Summer (Wednesday night youth worship once a month), and Fall (September through Christmas).

**Adaptations due to COVID-19:** The plans discussed never materialized. Pastor Birgitte offered online Bible stories for youth during the Spring season. The Christmas Program was recorded via Zoom from the homes of family members (Pierson, Peterson and Wolf) and used as the Christmas Day Worship Service for the Baudette Lutheran Parish.

#### Maintained youth records.

We continued to maintain and update the membership lists for all youth in the congregation.

#### • Continued to mail out *Splash! Newsletters*.

These parent pages are monthly newsletters that help families incorporate faith formation into the events of daily life. The newsletters are age specific and designed to focus on faith formation from birth up to age 3.









#### **Encouraged faith formation.**

#### Vacation Bible School.

- Colleen Stanton provided leadership for VBS Grades K-6 (July 20-24, 2020) Compassion Camp was the theme. This program was designed to be a virtual VBS experience and had lots of great resources available to help support families at home. Colleen Stanton, Sarah Pierson, and Pastor Birgitte all helped record various components and Pastor Birgitte helped put the pieces together into a slideshow for each day. There was an opening, Bible Story, Yoga/Movement, Craft, Music, and a Compassion in Action piece all included. We had 19 sets of materials delivered or picked up by families of the parish.
- Sarah Pierson provided leadership for pre-school VBS (August 3-6, 2020) The theme was Rainforest Explorers Jesus Leads the Way! The Concordia Publishing House curriculum was used. Sarah recorded the into, bible story and closing. There were videos provided for the puppet stories and Pastor Birgitte helped create the slide show for each day that was available on Facebook and Youtube. Colleen Stanton helped put backpacks together! We created approximately 20 backpacks with supplies. It was a lot of fun!

*Confirmation.* There were no youth confirmed in 2020 due to CoVid. Confirmands to be confirmed: Sam Stephani, Mia Gubbels, Riley Stromlund, Malik Klaustermeier.

- Pastor Birgitte offered Soul Food for the winter Session in January and February and then switched to Lent worship. Following that online classes were offered through May due to COVID.
- Samantha Lyon was contracted by the Baudette Lutheran Parish to provide leadership for Confirmation. She, along with Pastor Birgitte hosted a Confirmation Orientation (as part of Pizza Night on September 23, 2020 for youth and parents to share the plan for the coming year and a day-long retreat in October. Confirmation will look different during this school year. Please see Confirmation Report for more details.

#### **Annual Report 2020 Confirmation Update**

In approaching the 2020-2021 school year, the Parish hired me, Samantha Lyon, as a Community and Family Ministry Associate primarily to help Pastor Birgitte with the Confirmation curriculum and other community ministry opportunities that arose during the pandemic. In an attempt to build a meaningful curriculum that could withstand the flexibility required in a pandemic, we moved to a retreat model for the structure of Confirmation. These 8-hour weekend-day events offered two main advantages:

- 1. COVID precautions and scheduling flexibility Planning the curriculum to be delivered in more concentrated events provided for being able to move that event depending on what came of the pandemic. It also allowed us to schedule these days when COVID seemed less risky within the community (e.g., not during an outbreak in the school).
- 2. Concentrated time together Spending longer periods of time as a Confirmation group allowed for stronger group development and more progress in the curriculum. We are able to spend more time having fun, Bible- study activities, and spiritual discernment.

Our goal is to have 5 retreats throughout the year, each centered around a baptismal promise:

- 1. live among God's faithful people;
- 2. hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper;
- 3. proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed;
- 4. serve all people following the example of Jesus; and
- 5. strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

We held one of the 5 retreats prior the winter shutdown and were excited with the enthusiasm from our students. We had 16 students attend and spent the day playing games and discussing what it meant to live in community with one another. Our conversations centered around making positive impacts in our communities by reflecting on Luther's study of the 10 Commandments. We also built marshmallow and toothpick representations of our communities — many meaningful connections were made, and the appropriate amount of sugar consumed. We look forward to our next retreat, in which we will dig into the Lord's Supper by way of making bread!

#### **Outreach Ministries Committee Annual Report - 2020**

ROLE OF THE COMMITTEE: The role of the Outreach Ministries Committee is to promote, and direct projects and activities focused on assisting those in need in the local community and beyond.

- In February, the Bakeless Bake Sale was organized and distributed to the Women of the Wabanica Church to decide which missions to support this year. We collected \$1045.65, which was distributed to 4 organizations, each receiving \$234.37. Those organizations were: LLS Nutritional Board, Lake of the Woods School Backpack Program, Friends Against Abuse, and Brink Center.
- We sent 36 boxes of quilts to the Minneapolis Lutheran Relief Center in October.
- We also gave away quilts to the following:
  - 5 quilts and 1 afghan to fire victims.

### **Stewardship Report 2020**

The Northwest Minnesota Synod put together a team of pastors, lay leaders, and synod staff to organize and create resources for stewardship. These resources were geared specifically towards smaller congregations that didn't have a history of stewardship practices. The theme for 2020 was, "Lord, stir us to dream." As a member of the planning team, Pastor Birgitte decided to implement the program within the Parish. This was the first stewardship campaign in the parish in a very long time. Each week had a different theme- Lament, Repent, Dream, Celebrate- intended to help the congregation members engage with the faith practice and intention behind stewardship. A letter was sent out to our active member lists throughout the parish outlining the plan for the campaign. The third Sunday was set as the response Sunday in which members were asked to write down their financial commitment to their home congregation on an ornament, the commitments were kept confidential, and then hung on the Christmas tree at the front of our parking lot sanctuary. While there were not many responses this year, the campaign should be considered a success. We spent time together reflecting on stewardship and commitments to God and dreaming together of a future for the church. This was our first stewardship campaign, but it will definitely not be our last. We look forward to another campaign next year, one that will continue to lead us to ask, "Lord, stir us to dream."

In the early verses of Ephesians 4, the apostle Paul writes to the Christians in Ephesus, a city on the Aegean Sea at the mouth of a river and at the intersection of three trading routes. The letter was written about ten years after the church had started. During the early years of this congregation, Jews and Gentiles from several ethnicities and nationalities had come together to form "one body." Paul was aware that they had done well and commended them for their faith and love.

The word "one" appears more than seven times in the first four verses. This reflects the importance Paul gave to being called into the "unity of Christ." He wanted to note that, although many of the church members came from far off, there is "one Lord, one faith, one baptism." This oneness reflects God's gift of reconciliation in Christ.

A second emphasis from Paul was that, as believers, they were to "bear with one another in love." This would require humility, gentleness, and patience as each of them practiced their faith. It would require tolerance to "maintain unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

A third emphasis was that each person had been given gifts by God and that these gifts were given to increase the whole. Because the Ephesian church was a young congregation and its members were just beginning in their faith journey, their understandings were often tossed to and fro. But as they grew in faith, each person contributed to building up the body of Christ.

The fourth and final emphasis was that by "speaking the truth in love," each person must grow into Christ. This means taking time to learn about one another and their gifts. Knowing these gifts, we can do God's work both within and beyond the faith community. When there are decisions to make or relationships to reconcile, we know to begin with prayer and reflection, always desiring to speak the truth in love — not for our own benefit but for God's glory, that we might become more complete.

As our members and friends gather today, whether face-to-face or online, we are reminded of our calling into "unity in Christ." We come from many places and work in many contexts, and yet we recognize "one Lord, one faith, one baptism."

Whether new to a worshiping community or further along the journey, we realize that humility, gentleness, and patience are required both in the good times and especially in times of uncertainty and struggle. God wants us to be more complete through our work. Christ provides the way. The Holy Spirit is with us for guidance and courage. Each of us has been given the gifts to be complete, and through our faithfulness we will grow stronger and work together as one body.

Let us pray: Lord. let the words of the apostle Paul dwell in us deeply. May we embrace the reconciling power of oneness with Christ. May this oneness guide our congregation as we live into the new realities of these times. As we meet new partners in ministry, may we take time to get to know them with patience, humility, and love. Help us to see how sharing our gifts will make vour work easier and more fulfilling while bringing all of us closer to Christ. May the blessings you give each day strengthen us to a living, daring confidence in your grace. Amen.
